## FLYING OFFICER RYAN STILL CRITICAL

## Plane, Striking Haystack, Plunges Into Ground

MELBOURNE, Monday.—Flying-Officer L. J. Ryan, of the Air Force, who was injured when a Moth plane he was flying crashed near Laverton, about dusk on Sunday, was still in a very critical condition in the Caulfield Military Hospital tonight.

He was flying solo to Laverton from Point Cook, when he struck a haystack. The under carriage of the plane was torn off, and the machine, completely out of centrol, plunged into the earth about 30 yards beyond the stack.

Ryan is 24, and unmarried.

A Court of Enquiry on the crash is being held.
