Fairey Battle Planes For Air Training

The first batch of Fairey Battle aircraft provided by the British Government for the Empire air training scheme in Australia had arrived in Australia, the Minister for Air (Mr Fairbairn) said today.

FIRST BATCH HERE.

Can Carry 1,000lb of
Bombs.

MELBOURNE, Sunday.

The first batch of Fairey Battle aircraft, provided by the British Government for the Empire Air Scheme, has arrived in Australia, and the machines will be assembled immediately at Geelong.

In making this announcement yesterday, the Minister for Air, Mr. Fairbairn, said that the machines had a very high performance, and were capable of carrying 1000lb weight in bombs. The planes were the first of 336 Faireys and 591 Ansons which were being supplied by Britain. They would greatly increase the potential striking power of the R.A.A.F. against possible air attack.
