NOTICES TO AIRMEN.

No. 9 of 1925.

[T is hereby notified that an Emergency Landing Ground has been established at 126-MILE, WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

The following particulars regarding this Emergency Landing Ground are published for information:—

<i>Proprietors</i>	Commonwealth of Australia.
<i>Position</i>	Latitude, 26° 37' S.; longitude, 114° 9' E. Situating on telegraph line, 15 miles south of Hamelin Pool.
<i>Distinctive Features</i> ..	Ground is a prominent L-shaped clearing in scrub.
<i>Magnetic Variation</i> ..	2° 50' W. (approximately).
<i>Height above Sea Level</i>	About 150 feet.
<i>Description</i>	L-shaped ground, cleared from sand plain. Fairly firm surface. Water is apt to lie on north-east arm in wet weather.
<i>Dimensions for Landing</i>	North-east and south-west, 440 yards. North-west and south-east, 440 yards.
<i>Markings</i>	Ground marking (white cross, arms 25 feet long). Wind indicator on linesman's catchment shed to the west.
<i>Hangar Accommodation</i>	Nil.
<i>Approaches</i>	Over scrub, about 8 feet high, on all sides.
<i>Surrounding Country</i> ..	Scrubby sand plain.
<i>Petrol and Oil</i>	None in district.
<i>Workshops</i>	None in district.
<i>Nearest Railway Station</i>	None in district.
<i>Nearest Town</i>	Hamelin Pool, 15 miles north.
<i>Nearest Telephone</i> ..	Telephone line, 100 yards west of ground, could be tapped in emergency.
<i>Nearest Telegraph</i> ..	Hamelin Pool, about 15 miles north.
<i>Water Supply</i>	Linesman's tanks 100 yards west of ground.
<i>Charges</i>	Nil.
<i>Remarks</i>	This ground should only be used in case of emergency, though the surface is better than the 95 and 115-Mile grounds.
